When the Community Foundation of Utah (CFU) was established, our initial moniker was the Community Foundation for Social Entrepreneurship. Our founders were deeply rooted in Utah's entrepreneurial community, and shared a vision for the power collective philanthropy could bring to serve our state. Over the past decade this aspirational goal, along with a significant and sustained commitment of financial, intellectual, and human capital (and much hard work!), has come to be. Today, we are pleased to say that the concept of a community foundation has catalyzed into the cusp of something really powerful in Utah.

In 2022, CFU witnessed an exciting transformation in Utah's philanthropic landscape. As we exited the darkest days of the COVID-19 pandemic, CFU saw an explosion in the number of donors seeking to give collectively with a commitment to shared, measurable outcomes. This evolution in giving provides us with immense optimism for Utah's philanthropic ecosystem, as greater coordination can magnify our ability as a community to create meaningful, sustained impact.



The Growth of Collective Giving

2022 showcased the dedication of Utah's philanthropic community to come together to meet critical needs through CFU's Community Impact Funds. From refugee resettlement to homelessness, donors and organizations demonstrated an unprecedented level of coordination and commitment to achieving lasting outcomes across Utah and beyond our borders. Not only did Utah break new ground in the financial scale of collective grantmaking, the number of donors contributing to Community Impact Funds grew exponentially. These donors ranged from historic community institutions making multi-million dollar gifts to elementary students donating lemonade stand proceeds — a reminder that every action and every dollar is meaningful.

The Impact We Made,

Resettling a Historic Refugee Influx Together

The Utah Afghan Community Fund, through supporting the resettlement of over 900 Afghan humanitarian parolees, is the latest demonstration of Utah's long standing commitment to welcoming refugees. The Fund deployed over \$1.2 million to address resource gaps in basic needs, in addition to bridging cultural barriers for refugees' long term resettlement. Specifically, the Fund served as a complement to existing public and private funding streams, providing a range of support from legal assistance to home furnishings. The Fund created a vital central infrastructure for resettlement organizations to coordinate their efforts and maximize impact.

Utah's Groundbreaking Aid To Ukrainian Families

The Utah for Ukraine Fund was a first-of-its-kind model, allowing an entire community to come together to support women and children fleeing the war in Ukraine. Alongside the Driven to Assist community donation drive, the Fund raised \$4 million in just six weeks, catalyzed by a one-to-one match by the Larry H. and Gail Miller Family Foundation. The Fund supported critical relief services for Ukrainian refugees arriving in neighboring countries including education and childcare, direct cash assistance, and UNICEF blue dot centers. With over 3,600 donations—of which 90% were \$100 or less—the Utah for Ukraine Fund was a testament to Utah's spirit of generosity showing what a community can accomplish together.

A United Response to Homelessness

The Utah Impact Partnership Fund was formed as an extension of the Utah Impact Partnership to champion innovative, strategic, and collective efforts to systematically address homelessness statewide. To date, the Utah Impact Partnership Fund deployed nearly \$3.8 million in grants to secure deeply affordable housing, youth transitional housing, and support the development of a new detox facility in Salt Lake County. The Utah Impact Partnership Fund is a key tool in Utah's united response to homelessness. The Fund works in close coordination with the Utah Homelessness Council to identify impactful and timely projects that will move the needle on homelessness across the state.

Cultivating Philanthropic Learning Communities

Supporting the Next Generation of Donors

CFU continues to cultivate opportunities for donors to deepen their knowledge and networks within philanthropy. In partnership with the Walton Family Foundation, CFU launched its inaugural Give for Good cohort, a peer network of 16 next generation Utah philanthropists, anchored in a desire to explore philanthropic practice together. A first for our local philanthropic ecosystem, cohort participants worked together to learn about issues facing Utah and create a strategic framework to deploy a \$10,000 grant aligned with the participants' shared values and giving styles. Give for Good is an exciting indicator of the continued shift toward more engaged, collective, and strategic philanthropy in Utah.

Impact Investing with Utah's Brightest

In 2022 CFU launched Full Spec, a learning series focused on building a community of donors passionate about exploring ways to activate more assets within their philanthropic portfolio to create impact. The inaugural event featured a dive into Mission Related Investments, a strategy of investing charitable dollars into mission-driven social ventures. Attendees engaged with local social entrepreneurs in diverse fields from medical devices to legal tech, and learned how the work of companies like these can complement a donor's grantmaking strategy. In 2023 CFU will expand Full Spec, providing further educational opportunities at the intersection of impact investing and philanthropy.



Sharing Resources for Family Foundations

The Utah Grantmakers Alliance (UGA) serves as a learning community of local family foundations and donors committed to sharing best-practices to maximize their philanthropic impact. In 2022, UGA focused on innovation and next generation giving to create collective change. Abby and Clark Ivory of the Clark and Christine Ivory Foundation shared their expertise on creating innovation in housing affordability. UGA also hosted Natalie Gochnour of the Kem C. Gardner Policy Institute in a discussion on the broader demographic and community needs facing Utah over the next decade, and how philanthropy can best meet these needs.





Sabbaticals — An Innovative Investment in Nonprofit Leadership

Talented and effective leadership is a critical ingredient to any organization's success. Recent years have proved challenging to attract, develop, and retain top talent within Utah nonprofits. To combat burnout and create space for innovation, CFU's Invest in Success initiative expanded its scope to include a sabbatical for nonprofit executives. In partnership with the American Express Center for Community Development, CFU provided a week of immersive leadership development to a cohort of seven nonprofit executives, followed by a week-long sabbatical where these leaders disengaged completely from their organizations to explore new ideas and strategies.

Immersing Students in Impact Careers

As part of CFU's broader strategy to attract, develop, and retain top talent in Utah's nonprofit sector, CFU selected five outstanding graduate students to serve as the 2022 Morgan Stanley Community Development Graduate Fellows. In partnership with Morgan Stanley and the University of Utah, these Fellows were paired with organizations to develop their skills, build their networks, and receive hands-on experience in community development work.

Examples of Fellowship projects include:

- Developing a structured system to incorporate, encourage, and elevate the voices of people with lived homelessness expertise regarding program delivery and services
- Shepherding the acquisition and substantial rehabilitation of a 24-unit public housing family rental development
- Conducting ethnographic research on 600+ graduates of a community leadership institute and the success of their projects since graduating
